### Tolerance

At Hayes Meadow we actively promote diversity through our celebrations of different faiths and cultures. RE and PSHE lessons and opportunities within our wider curriculum, reinforce messages of tolerance and respect for others.

Pupils explore positive role models and have the opportunity to challenge prejudicial and discriminatory behaviour through their learning and the texts we choose.

### The Rule of Law

Pupils are taught from an early age the rules of the school and their class. They are taught the value and reasons behind rules and laws, that they govern and protect us, the responsibilities that this involve, the consequences when rules are broken and the rewards and celebrations for adhering to these rules.
